Re: Ordinance 2024-19-18 Chapman School land purchase

An independent appraisal is the generally accepted standard to establish a fair land purchase price. Paying 4.8 times the assessed value for these properties, without a supporting appraisal is fiscally irresponsible. However, I am distressed even more by the process that got us here. It lacks transparency and honesty.

The borough assessing department insists property assessments are at fair market value. These four parcels are assessed at \$164,000. The memo attached to the ordinance claims the proposed purchase price of \$800,000 is fair because it is "consistent with market comparables in this area." These two assertions are inconsistent. Property owners in the vicinity would choke and revolt if their property assessments jumped 480%. The comparable Aaron Hughes cited to the Planning Commission was the borough purchase of land, at inflated prices, adjacent to the Anchor Point fire station for Western Emergency Service Area. This is hardly an ordinary land transaction reflecting true market comparables.

One of the parcels has a huge hole in the ground from past gravel extraction. Why was this not disclosed in the memo? This is a liability and will cost a lot of money to fill to make a playground or parking lot.

Did the borough look for other suitably sized parcels for a new Anchor Point school? Perhaps farther from the busy Sterling Highway, allowing this old facility to be repurposed? One that could be purchased at fair market value established by an independent appraisal?

Why is the borough not honest? If these are the only appropriate properties to provide for adequate school expansion, why not say so? Admit that the landowners have the borough over the barrel and will not agree to sell based on an independent appraisal? Please help me understand why the purchase of these parcels at this price is a responsible decision for the school and borough taxpayers.

I'd like to submit this letter in support of purchasing land to expand Chapman School. I'm a taxpayer, I believe in brainstorming options and searching for the most logical, cost-efficient path forward. Our community is growing and school enrollment is climbing, which is wonderful but does present some growing pains. The opportunity to acquire land adjoining the current school property uniquely provides the opportunity to utilize the current space, address safety problems, and plan something better.

Student pick-up and drop-off have been an ongoing, twice daily traffic safety hazard for years. Purchasing this property offers a relatively quick solution to a dangerous problem, and might even offer space for the high school bus stop, which currently is completely off campus.

Student enrollment at Chapman continues to climb, and portable classrooms are an expensive, mediocre fix at best as they do not include restrooms or even a sink. Students crammed into shared space without even the facilities to wash hands in is pretty gross, and middle school science class without a sink is extra challenging.

Chapman School is in the "sweet spot" of a growing community with a small town feel, benefiting from an extraordinary amount of volunteer involvement and community partnering. The parents, staff, and volunteers are engaged, and that's keeping the kids engaged. A huge percentage of students k-8<sup>th</sup> grade are involved in extracurricular, largely volunteer-led, activities ranging from sports, chess club, basketball club, cheer, violin, breakfast with buddies, 3D printing, and an ambitious trip to Yellowstone National Park. Volunteers raise money with an annual carnival, our new booster club banner program and many other events. All this activity requires an immense amount of staff flexibility, schedule juggling, and some pretty creative use of building space. In other words, we're doing our part to make our school the best it can be.

Bottom line, the community of Anchor Point supports Chapman School and I hope the assembly will too. The current school leadership and climate are outstanding, the community support is remarkable, the opportunity to purchase property right next door is rare. Chapman is the kind of school the Kenai Peninsula Borough wants to have, lets fuel it.
