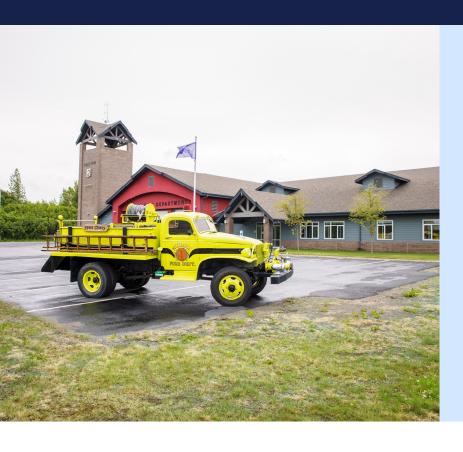

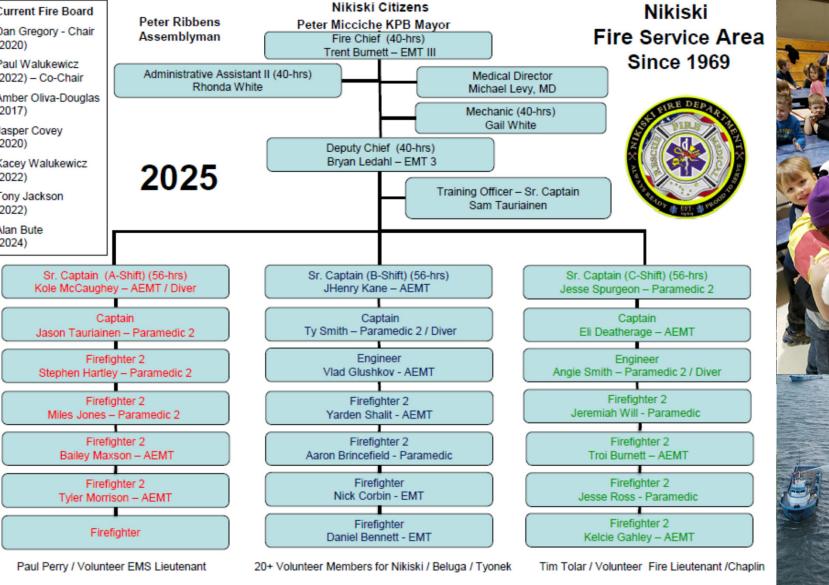

FY25 Accomplishments

- Received Federal grant for a pickup mounted skid unit for increased wildland fire response.
- Completed the wildland fire preparedness program in conjunction with OEM and WiRe.
- Extensive training including State Fire Conference, EMS symposium, Dive Rescue class, Fire Chief's Conference and Paramedic refresher.
- Established and filled a new Training Officer position.
- Continued health & wellness initiative by making physical fitness a top priority.



FY26 Objectives/Highlights

- Reduce Mil rate from 2.7 to 2.45
- Transfer \$1,000,000 to Capital Project fund for anticipated future equipment replacement. Also to bring fund balance closer to compliance.
- Purchase new ambulance, send older ambulance to Tyonek.
- Repair Station 2 fill site to ensure year-round reliability.
- Continue Station 2 training grounds project.
- Purchase/replace 1 additional pickup for emergency response and daily operations.
- Provide training and support to the communities of Tyonek and Beluga.

Project Name	Medic 4 Replacement
Priority	High (Priority 1)
Total Funding	\$375,000

This project is intended to replace 1 aging ambulance for NFSA. This will allow NFSA to update the ambulance fleet in Tyonek. The ambulance in Tyonek is a 2008 and has high mileage and increasing mechanical issues.



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Capital Project Fund Summary

Project Name	Station 2 Hydrant Repair
Priority	High (Priority 2)
Total Funding	\$60,000

This project is intended to fix a fill-site located at Station 2 that keeps freezing during the winter months. The project includes excavating the water line and wrapping with heat tape to prevent freezing. This also includes burying and repaving the dug-up areas.



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Capital Project Fund Summary

Project Name	Unit Emergency Response Vehicle Replacement
Priority	High (Priority 3)
Total Funding	\$75,000

This project is intended to replace an emergency response vehicle that is operating out of Station 2. This vehicle is used for daily emergency responses and is starting to have mechanical issues.



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Significant Budgetary Items

Off-Road UTV/ambulance for Tyonek Code Blue Grant 20% Match -Up to \$60,000 approved by NFSA Board



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Long Term Issues and Concerns

- Large equipment replacement on the horizon with increased costs and timelines.
- Unknown future of local Oil/Gas industry.
- Recruitment/retention an ongoing issue.
- Unreliable radio communications due to lack of ALMR infrastructure in our area.
