SOURCEST CLASS - THISING CLASSIFERS

This year KPC and KPBSD partnered to offer a full EMT class at Soldotna High School. The class is being taught by KPC EMT instructor Tiffani Perry with 15 students enrolled. After the first quarter of classes the students are doing well with many of them maintaining a 4.0 GPA. Students have really had to step up their reading though as they will cover almost 1000 pages in their EMT textbook during the semester. The class is being offered with dual-credit (8 credits) with the college and nine (9) of the students have accepted that challenge. The class is taught during the first two-hours of school every day from 7:45 am till 9:30 am and mirrors the KPC course agenda.







On October 4th the SOHI EMT, KPC EMT, and several of the KPC Paramedic students went on a day long field trip and participated in a mock MCI drill that is held biannually with the City of Kenai Airport and the Kenai Fire Department. SOHI students played the victims of a Dash-8 incident with 22 victims that crashed into the mouth of the Kenai River. Students were moulaged with multiple injuries and then triaged and transported from the city docks to the hospital in ambulances from Nikiski and Kenai as part of the exercise.

All of the students reported that it was a very educational experience and even though it rained cats and dog the entire time they had a lot of fun. This was apparent by the number of "selfies" and "tic-tok" videos that were produced during the drill.


