
## Our Organizational Structure






# Homer/Anchor Point 1/31/2023


## Homer

- 78 attended newly branded Community Resource Connect
- Held at the SPARC

### **Anchor Point**

- 43 attended at the Anchor Point Food Pantry and Anchor River Inn
- Approximately 20% reported living in a place not meant for habitation. 28.1% reported being Alaska Native/American Indian/or Indigenous Approximately 34% reported being homeless for a year or more. 43.8% reported residing in Homer as their last permanent address 29.8% reported residing in Anchor Point as their last permanent address Victims of domestic violence were of higher than normal rates







## 2023 Point in Time Count/PHC

Where did you sleep on 1/30/2023?

The Point in Time Count is a count of sheltered and unsheltered persons experiencing homelessness carried out on one night in the last 10 calendar days of January. According to HUD guidance, the PIT count should be completed using unduplicated counts or statistically reliable estimates of persons experiencing homelessness in both sheltered and unsheltered locations on a single night.

Project Homeless Connect is honored as a best practice model by HUD.

# Types of Homelessness For 2023

- Homeless: 20%
- Institutional:2%
- Temporary/Permanent: 56%

\*21% reported "Other"





# Episodes of Homelessness

• 1<sup>st</sup> Time: 29%

• 2<sup>nd</sup> -3<sup>rd</sup> Time: 33%

• 4 or More Times: 23%



## What the people need:





- 84% stated if an emergency cold weather shelter existed, they would use it.
- Primary needs reported: Transportation & Food
- Secondary Needs: Clothing, Lifeline phone, funding for license, fuel/gas/propane, energy assistance

## Highlights of the 2023 Event

- 4 animals received supplies
- 96 individuals participated representing a total of 164 community members
- 62% reported this was their first PHC event
- 19% were between 18-34, prime employability
- 16% were veterans
- 8% slept in the car the night prior
- 45% had been homeless for a year or more
- 39% reported their last permanent address in Kenai
- 33% reported their last permanent address in Soldotna
- 50% reported being a survivor of domestic violence



## **ALASKA**

In Alaska, the Fair Market Rent (FMR) for a two-bedroom apartment is \$1,264. In order to afford this level of rent and utilities — without paying more than 30% of income on housing — a household must earn \$4,215 monthly or \$50,578 annually. Assuming a 40-hour work week, 52 weeks per year, this level of income translates into an hourly Housing Wage of:

# 100% Community Survey Data on Housing

In January, community members were surveyed to determine community needs for vital and essential services. Questions were asked specifically about housing.

Approximately 3% of those surveyed stated they did not have a safe place to reside during the winter.

Approximately 58% stated they would use a cold weather shelter if accessible.

Approximately 55% had heard of the Nikiski Shelter of Hope.

## Shelter of Hope

#### As of 2/22/2023:

- 93 adults have been housed
- 30 children have been housed
- 19 pets
- 18,000 meals served

Equating to 6,808 bed nights since operation in December 2022!

### As of 3/8/2023:

- 95 adults have been housed
- 30 children have been housed
- 19 pets
- 21,000 meals served

Equating to 7,200 bed nights since operation in December 2022!
