Provide fair, predictable, and proactive funding.


- Focus on recruitment and retention of high-quality educators by investing in defined benefits.





How much does Alaska spend on K-12 education?

In 2019, ISER analyzed Alaska's per-pupil spending compared to that of other U.S. states, using 2017 figures. In this update, we use the same methods to contextualize Alaska's 2019 spending.

Alaska still ranks 6th highest in nominal per-pupil spending among states. However, the 2019 figures show that per-pupil spending in raw dollars was 39% higher than the U.S. average, compared to 46% higher in 2017. After adjusting for Alaska's higher living costs, and accounting for differing per-pupil spending costs across the state, the figures show that Alaska's 2019 per student spending was only 93% of the national average, compared to 98% in 2017 (see table below).

These figures show that while Alaska increased spending on K-12 education between 2017 and 2019, other states increased their investments even more.


