We are writing to encourage you to please override Mayor Charlie Pierce's veto of budget amendments that would remove \$652,000 support for the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District and \$206,000 for the Kenai Peninsula Tourism Marketing Council. According to the Peninsula Clarion, Pierce's veto was based on (1) the assembly not agreeing on where the \$858,000 would come from and (2) not agreeing with KPTMC on how they should market.

According to the Kenai Peninsula Economic Development District's 2017 Situation and Prospects – the most recent available on KPEDD's website – the borough has a school district to be proud of: "The Kenai Peninsula Borough School District is a top performer in Alaska. Test scores and graduation rates beat state averages, dropout rates are less, and a national school ranking website identifies it as the $4^{\rm th}$ top school district in Alaska. Teaching excellence in the borough school district includes 2016-2017 Alaska Teacher-of-the-Year, the alternate, and the Alaska Humanities Teacher-of-the-Year." Superintendent Sean Dusek said the \$652,000 was intended to hire counselors to work with younger students in support of mental health. In other words, it would make the district and its ability to address the needs of borough children even better. The borough's children are its future. Reducing this support is like cutting off our own nose to spite our face.

This week – a spectacularly beautiful 4th of July week in terms of weather – everywhere we've looked on the southern peninsula (Soldotna to Homer) has proven what a hot tourist spot this is. License plates from other states and countries. RVs bearing stickers from Anchorage rental companies. Foreign accents. Beaches covered with tents. Parking places that couldn't be found. Again referring to KPEDD's 2017 Situation and Prospects, "In 2016, tourism remained steady on the Peninsula and was an economic bright spot. The number of visitors to the Peninsula rose and industry-related sales, employment, and wages all increased. ... Tourism promises to be a growing advantage for the Kenai Peninsula, which caters to other Southcentral Alaska visitors, US travelers, and a growing international tourist market." Tourism's gross business sales were \$271 million in 2015 and increased to \$276 million in 2016. If this weekend is any judge of what 2018 will be like, we can safely assume a continued increase. For the mayor to withdraw financial support from marketing experts because he thinks they should market differently doesn't seem to make sense.

Kenai Peninsula Borough's children and its tourism industry are too important to become fiscal sticking points. Please restore the funding.
