The four main challenges with current elections are:

1. Low voter turnout at borough elections.

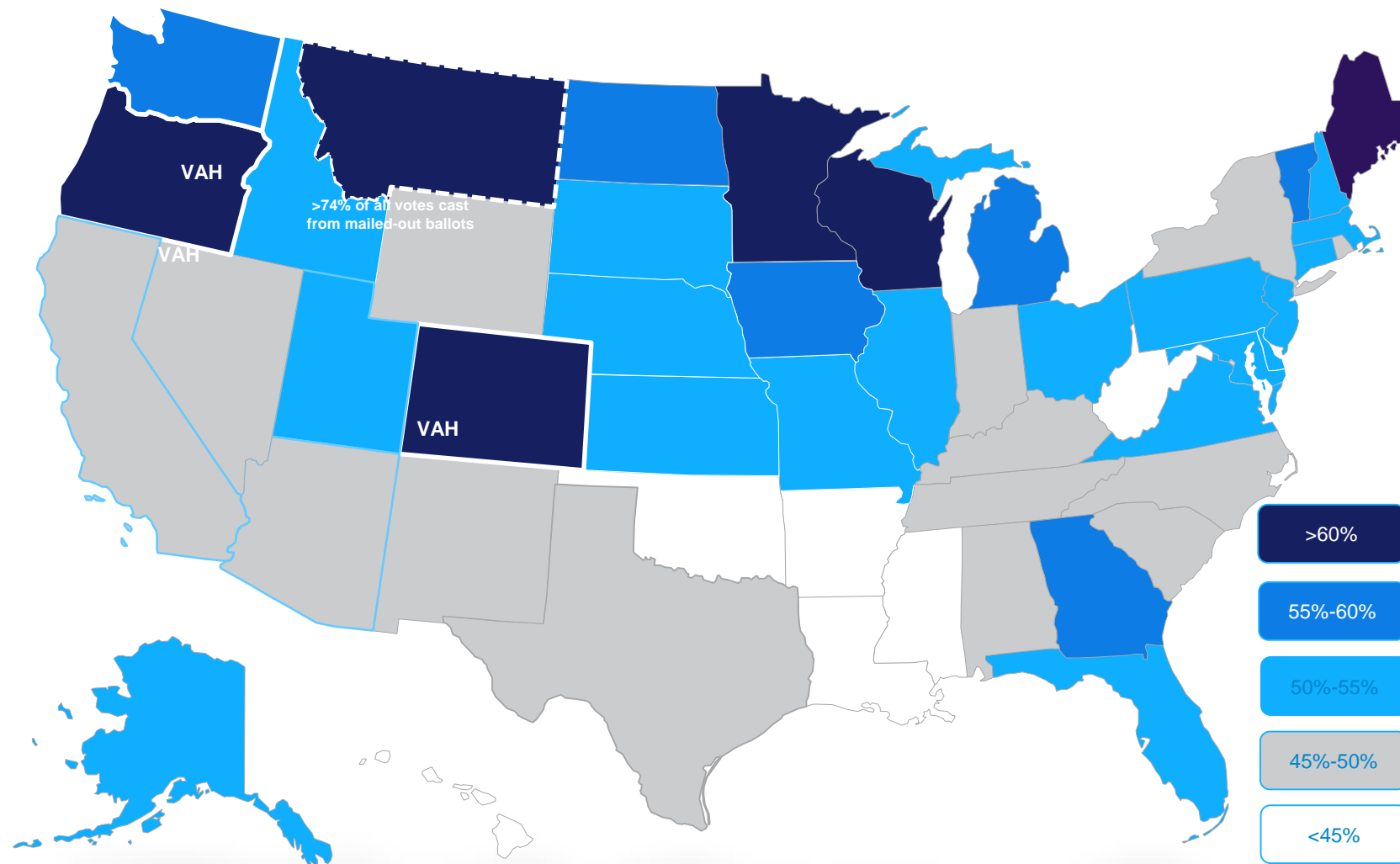

2. Precinct-based elections are an inefficient use of community resources. It is an enormous task to set up precincts, issue and track supplies, machines, and ballots going to and from the precincts. We currently run a two-tier system of elections that combines traditional precinct-based voting with absentee by mail and in person voting; this is complicated and redundant. We use outdated machines from the State and the failure rate of these machines is getting higher.

3. Every year, we face challenges in hiring, training, and retaining election officials and poll workers.

CDC GUIDANCE

Actions for elections officials in advance of election day

- Encourage voters to use voting methods that minimize direct contact with other people and reduce crowd size at polling stations.
- **Encourage mail-in methods of voting if allowed in the jurisdiction.**
- **Encourage early voting, where voter crowds may be smaller throughout the day. This minimizes the number of individuals a voter may come in contact with.**
- Encourage drive-up voting for eligible voters if allowed in the jurisdiction.
- Encourage voters planning to vote in-person on election day to arrive at off-peak times. For example, if voter crowds are lighter mid-morning, advertise that in advance to the community.
- **Encourage relocating polling places** from nursing homes, long-term care facilities, and senior living residences, to minimize COVID-19 exposure among older individuals and those with chronic medical conditions.
- Consider additional social distancing and other measures to protect these individuals during voting.

CDC GUIDANCE, CONT'D.

Preventive actions polling workers can take

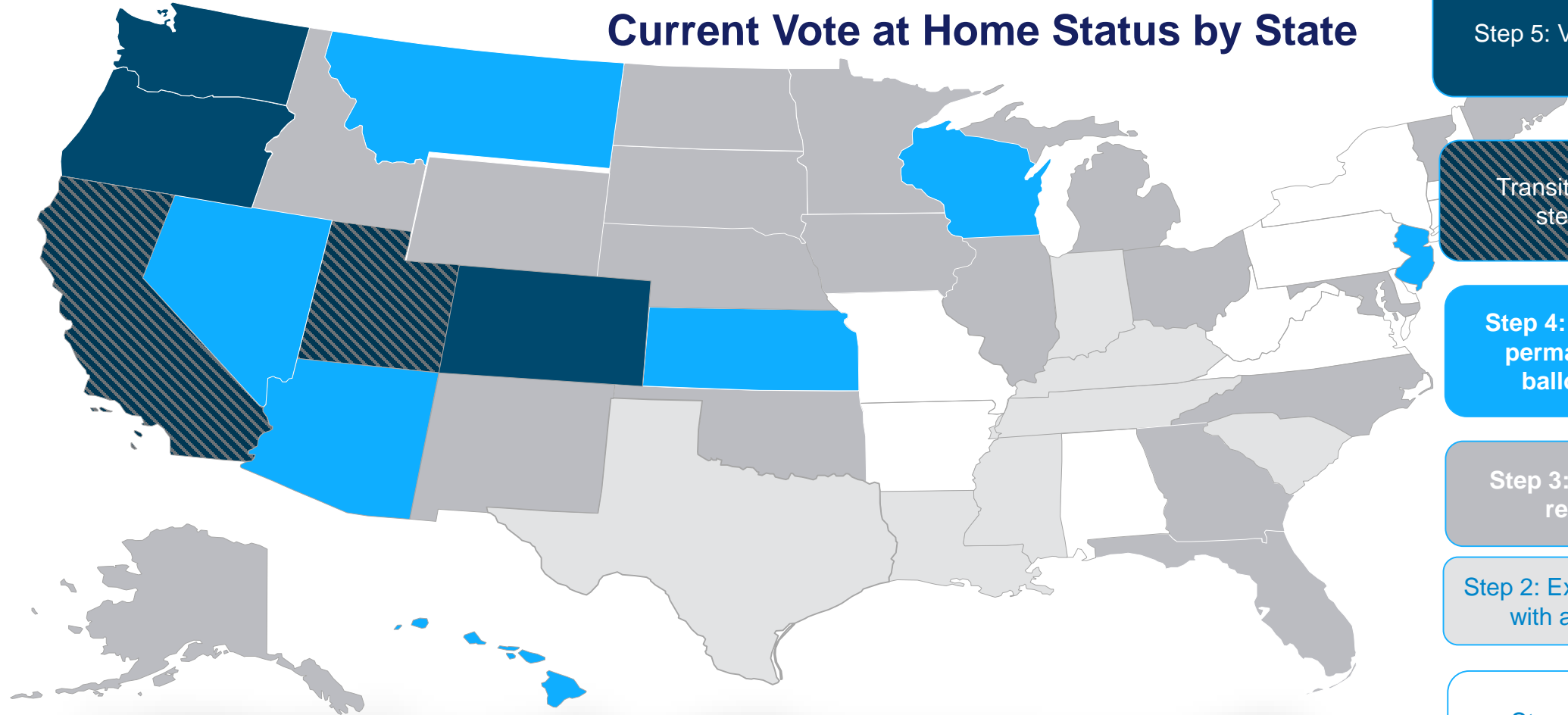
- **Stay at home if you have fever, respiratory symptoms, or believe you are sick.**
- Practice hand hygiene frequently.
- Practice routine cleaning of frequently touched **surfaces:** including tables, doorknobs, light switches, handles, desks, toilets, faucets, sinks, etc.
- Disinfect surfaces that may be contaminated with germs after cleaning.
- Clean and disinfect voting-associated equipment (e.g., voting machines, laptops, tablets, keyboards) routinely.

CDC GUIDANCE, CONT'D.

Recommendations for processing mail-in ballots

- Workers handling mail in ballots should practice hand hygiene frequently
- No additional precautions are recommended for storage of ballots

Additional Benefits

- Very similar to voting absentee by mail. In fact, many states allow voters to register once as permanent absentee vote by mail. True vote by mail is even better than voting absentee by mail because you don't have to fill out an application form every year.
- Maximizes voter confidence in their choices.

Example:

- A 2014 Study in Washington State found that not only did voter participation increase, especially in non-presidential election years, but that **voters were also more prone to completely fill out their ballot.**
- Introduces greater efficiencies in the process; relies on fewer, but more highly trained, election workers.
- Popular among voters who were already voting absentee by mail.
- Secure – ballots are dropped off at secure locations or put in the mail and transferred to a secure, central location.
- Accountable – vote by mail systems provide tracking and auditing features not available with the current system.
- **No change between old and new systems on one very important issue:**

Who and what you voted for remains confidential!!

How To Vote

- Ballots are mailed approx. 2-3 weeks prior to election day
- Fill out ballot
- Insert in Return Envelope
- Sign the Return Envelope
- Mail or drop at Accessible Vote Centers or into a Ballot Drop Box

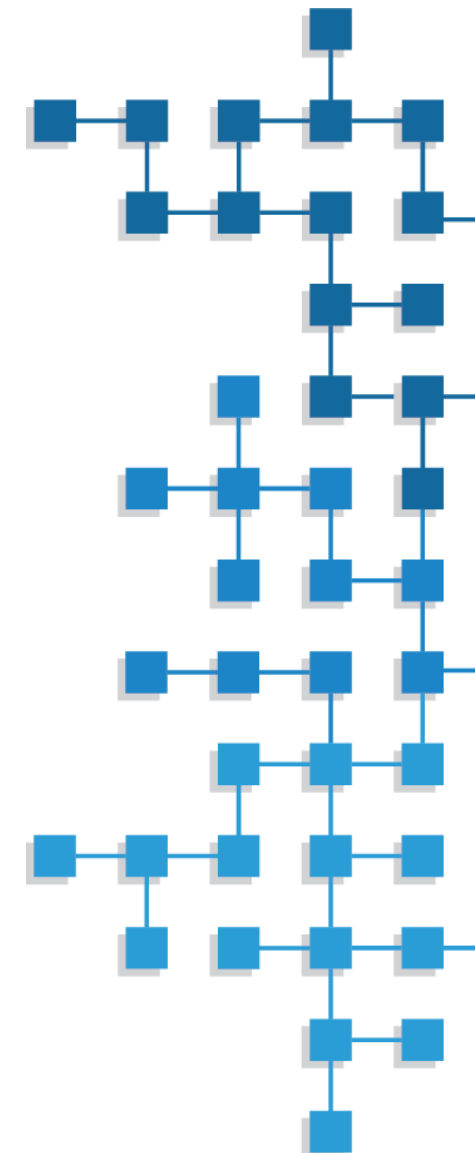
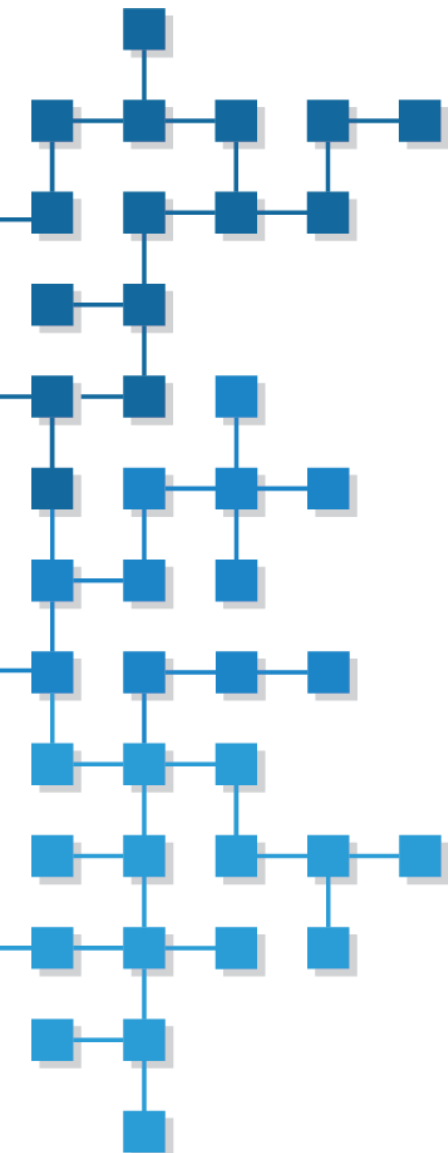
