### Dear Borough Assembly Members,

Thank you for your thoughtful discussion regarding Ordinance 2020-24 to transition the KPB to a vote by mail hybrid system. In some respects, your discussion mirrored the conversations held during the Election Stakeholders Group meetings as we vetted the pros and cons of moving to a vote by mail hybrid system. I appreciate Mr. Carpenter's concerns and interest in bringing the ordinance back for reconsideration. While I encourage you to not reconsider the ordinance, Mr. Carpenter has provided an opportunity to address some of the points raised during public testimony and assembly discussion.

Mr. Carpenter noted in his comments that the National Conference of State Legislators (NCSL) provides a brief introduction to vote by mail systems, presenting 3 pros and 5 cons. I appreciate Mr. Carpenter seeking valuable nonpartisan sources on the vote by mail issue. Below are the pros and cons presented by NCSL:

# **Possible Advantages**

- Voter convenience and satisfaction—Citizens can vote at home and take all the time they need to study the issues. Voters often express enthusiasm for all-mail elections.
- Financial savings—Jurisdictions may save money because they no longer need to staff
  traditional polling places with poll workers and equip each polling place with voting machines.
   A 2016 study of Colorado from the Pew Charitable Trusts found that costs decreased an
  average of 40 percent in five election administration categories across 46 of Colorado's 64
  counties (those with available cost data). However, the study examines a number of reforms
  that Colorado enacted in 2013, with all-mail elections being the most significant. Others
  included instituting same day registration and shortening the time length for residency in the
  state for voting purposes.

Turnout—Some reports indicate that because of convenience, voter turnout increases. These
reports assert that turnout increases by single digits for presidential elections and more in
smaller elections. See this 2013 report on all-mail ballot elections in Washington and this
2018 report on all-mail ballot elections in Utah. Effects on turnout can be more pronounced for
low propensity voters, those that are registered but do not vote as frequently.

## **Possible Disadvantages**

- Tradition—The civic experience of voting with neighbors at a local school, church, or other polling place no longer exists.
- Disparate effect on some populations—Mail delivery is not uniform across the nation. Native
  Americans on reservations may in particular have difficulty with all-mail elections. Many do not
  have street addresses, and their P.O. boxes may be shared. Literacy can be an issue for some
  voters, as well. Election materials are often written at a college level. (Literacy can be a
  problem for voters at traditional polling place locations too.) One way to mitigate this is to
  examine how voter centers are distributed throughout counties to best serve the population.
- Security—During all-mail elections (and absentee voting), coercion by family members or others might occur.
- Financial considerations—All-mail elections greatly increase printing costs for an election.
   Additionally, jurisdictions must have appropriate equipment to read paper ballots at a central location, and changing from electronic equipment to equipment that can scan paper ballots can be expensive.
- Slow vote counting—All-mail elections may slow down the vote counting process, especially if
  a state's policy is to allow ballots postmarked by Election Day to be received and counted in
  the days and weeks after the election.

Please note the financial savings/considerations appear in both the advantages and disadvantages categories. The Election Stakeholder Group discussed financial considerations at length and I urge you to review the group's report to the assembly. One thing to consider is that the borough's election equipment is aging and needs to be replaced, so the timing is good to invest in vote by mail infrastructure.

NCSL raises important issues to consider and account for in planning a vote by mail system; however, there are no show-stoppers in the "possible disadvantages" category. The tradition of in-person voting is strong on the Kenai Peninsula, to the point that some communities have celebrations such as potlucks, and with the borough's plan for a hybrid system individuals who want to will still have the opportunity to vote in person on election day. The issues labeled disparate effects on some populations and security are very important issues to resolve. Note that communities in the borough that are predominantly Alaska Native populations—Tyonek, Port Graham, and Nanwalek—already participate in the vote by mail system as their remote locations make this system advantageous. Also note that the primary reason for forming the Election Stakeholders Group and evaluating a vote by mail hybrid system was to provide reasonable accommodation to voters with disabilities. Security, which in the context of the NCSL list is related to coercion of family members or others, is a serious issue (and a societal issue we must address well beyond the single topic of voting). However, coercion can occur with absentee voting (as noted in NCSL's list) and can be alleviated by having

voting centers available, allowing someone under the influence of a family member to vote alone when they have opportunity during the election period.

I'd like to call attention to what the list does not include: voter fraud. The potential for voter fraud in a vote by mail system was the main point of opposition raised during public testimony. Voter fraud is something we should all be concerned about, regardless of the method of voting, and there are no data to demonstrate that a vote by mail system is inherently more prone to voter fraud than our traditional system. Election integrity and the potential for voter fraud was a central theme of Election Stakeholder Group meetings. I came away confident that the borough clerks know what they are doing when it comes to elections and, for clerks, integrity is among the most important aspects of conducting elections. Fraud can take a number of different forms, electronic hacking of voting machines from outside actors and intentionally manipulating individual ballots covering the bulk of the issues. The system proposed for the borough would include voting equipment that is not connected to any network and that requires an electronic key to access, greatly reducing the possibility that the borough voting system would be hacked by outside actors. The system includes paper ballots, another important feature. The proposed system also has safeguards to protect against an individual intentionally (or unintentionally) voting twice or voting for someone else. The signature verification process is a powerful tool in the vote by mail hybrid system. I encourage you to talk to your clerks about the system and how it would work.

Another point raised in public testimony for Ordinance 2020-24 was the U.S. Postal Service, specifically the potential for delivery delays and lost mail. Alleviation of delivery delays is a planning issue for the clerks—when to mail voting materials and ballots to KPB voters so they receive the information well in advance of election day and what date to require as a postmark for returned ballots. The potential for lost mail is low, it happens but it is rare, and is remedied by the flexibility of the vote by mail hybrid system itself. Individuals may vote in person at a voting center or they can drop their ballot in one of the drop boxes that would be placed around the borough. U.S. Postal Service representatives presented to the Election Stakeholder Group and I specifically asked if they had the capacity to handle the volume of ballots. They do.

Thank you again for your thoughtful consideration of this ordinance and for your concern about the integrity of our election process, a pillar of our democracy. After consideration of the issue between your assembly meetings, I encourage you to vote against reconsideration.

As an election worker, I see that all bases are covered. There is already early voting accepted ahead of the election date, absentee voting, and disabled persons who cannot present in person can still vote, even on the day of election, by having their representative physically take a ballot to their location and return by close of the polls. Those who are not registered to vote in any precinct can still vote by questioned ballot in any precinct, and election results are available at the end of the voting day. In a close race, the results are dependent upon the questioned ballots and votes already mailed in. I believe that the extra scrutiny of eligibility to vote produces a true and accurate vote, which is not as assured by voting by mail. I have also noted that many parents bring their children in as an education experience to see the American process of election, and many show a great deal of pride and assurance their voice has been heard.

Granted, election workers receive a small stipend to work on election day; but I can't see that the costs associated with that outweigh the costs associated with voting by mail; and the element of true and accurate eligibility to vote is certainly diminished. On many occasions, I see a verified person come in to vote and, upon signing the register and seeing similar names near their signature line, state that the relative or other known person has either moved away, died, or is otherwise not eligible to vote. If you send out packets to vote by mail according to the register, you'd be sending to ineligible voters; and the costs associated with that would be cumbersome and open to abuse.
